

Sadly, we have to say goodbye to Mrs Lincow this week. We have really enjoyed having her at our school and will miss her.





Devon Cream Tea

Recipe for Scones

Ingredients:

225g self raising flour

pinch of salt

55g butter

25g caster sugar

150ml milk

1 egg - beaten

Method

Heat oven to 220°C.

Mix together the flour and salt and rub in the butter.

Stir in sugar and milk to make a soft dough.

Knead lightly on a floured surface until about 2cm thick.

Cut out rounds and place on a lightly greased baking sheet.

Brush the tops with the beaten egg.

Bake for 12 to 15 minutes.

Cool on a wire rack.

A cream tea is a traditional dish often enjoyed by people on holiday in Devon, although it is sometimes available in other parts of Britain. It consists of one or two scones served with clotted cream, strawberry jam and a pot of fresh tea.
